Michelin has won Rally Australia 18 times, half of them with Finnish drivers

Volkswagen and Michelin won the event four times in a row

Michelin has failed to win just one of the 129 Rally Australia stages contested since 2011!









Start ceremony to be held near Coffs Harbour Pier

Service Park again based in Coffs Harbour International Stadium

16 of the 24 stages are either new, modified or run in the opposite direction

The longest stage (Welshs Creek Reverse, 28.84km) uses more than half of the former Nambucca stage

Coldwater is a new stage

Sherwood is identical to 2017

The Raleigh and Destination NSW superspecials are dirt and asphalt

The finish ceremony will take place at the end of the Power Stage (Wedding Bells, run in the opposite direction)

# **RALLY AUSTRALIA**

Rally Australia was a WRC round for the first time in 1989

The event was originally based in Perth, Western Australia

Rally Australia has been held in New South Wales since 2009

Rally Australia did not count towards the WRC from 2006 to 2009

Rally Australia's organisers 'invented' the so-called super-special concept with Perth's Langley Park stage. They were also the first to introduce timing to onetenth of a second

Juha Kankkunen holds the record for the highest number of Rally Australia wins (4), ahead of Ogier, Grönholm and Hirvonen (3)

Toyota secured its last WRC Manufacturers' title in Australia in 1999

## RALLY AUSTRALIA TRIVIA

Coffs Harbour was founded in 1847 after Captain John Korff sought shelter from a storm there

Coffs Harbour is famous for its surfing and banana plantations

Solitary Islands Marine Park, which stretches 75km from the coast, is a magnet for divers and New South Wales' third-biggest protected marine park

Coffs Harbour International Stadium was the scene for FIFA international soccer's biggest winning margin after Australia beat American Samoa 31-0!

Australia is the season's second southern-hemisphere round after Argentina

The WRC's annual gala dinner will be held on the Monday evening after the rally at the Museum of Contemporary Art in Sydney

### DOWN MEMORY LANE



1988: Michelin's first Rally Australia win

Thirty years ago, Rally Australia was based in Freemantle, near Perth, West Australia. It was a WRC candidate round and was won by Sweden's Ingvar Carlsson (Mazda 323 4WD).

Although the 1988 Commonwealth Bank Rally Australia 'only' counted towards the Asia-Pacific Championship, its organisers had their sights set on WRC status which they earned the following year.

The 60 or so-strong entry included Mazda Rally Team Europe's Ingvar Carlsson. He was the only top European driver and his chief opponents were New Zealander Possum Bourne (Subaru RX Turbo) and Japan's Kenjiro Shinozuka (Mitsubishi Galant VR-4).

Ingvar and Per Carlsson's first international success in their Mazda 323 4WD/Michelin made up for a tough WRC campaign which included DNFs on the Monte Carlo and in Portugal. The following season, Carlsson went on to claim WRC wins in Sweden and New Zealand.

## WRC TYRE-RELATED REGULATIONS

- The FIA has registered three different tyre manufactures for the 2018 WRC: Michelin, DMack and Pirelli
- Car manufacturers must register the tyre brand they have chosen with the FIA
- Only moulded tyres are authorised
- Tyres must be identifiable by a barcode and RFID chip
- Re-cutting or otherwise modifying the tread pattern is not permitted
- Only marked tyres are allowed to be used on stages
- Tyre pre-heating systems are prohibited
- ✓ Cars may carry up to two spares
- Tyres may only be inflated using air
- Only one type of dry-weather asphalt tyre (same construction and pattern) and two compound options are authorised for the season (a third compound option is allowed for the Rallye Monte-Carlo)
- Just one type of asphalt rain tyre is authorised
- Only one type of gravel tyre (same construction and pattern) and three compound options (from Rally Finland onwards) are authorised for the season (two compounds to be nominated prior to each event)
- ✓ A single type of snow/ice tyre (one compound only) to be fitted to 7x15-inch rims
- A single 'joker' change is allowed per manufacturer in the course of the season
- ✓ Tyre quotas per event for priority drivers are calculated on the basis of four tyres per tyre-change opportunity (plus four tyres for shakedown)
